Bio-Bibliographical Notes

Professor Hildegard Hammerschmidt-Hummel is a German anglicist, literary and cultural critic and writer. She studied English, History and Political Science at the University of Marburg, earning her PhD in English Literature in 1972. After her *habilitation* at the University of Mainz in 1977, she was granted the *venia legendi* for "English Philology." Hammerschmidt-Hummel has been teaching English Literature and Cultural Studies at the University of Mainz since then. From 1979 to 1982, she was on sabbatical leave and served as Consul for Cultural Affairs at the German Consulate General in Toronto.

From 1982 to 2005, she was the senior research scholar and editor of the research project "The Shakespeare Illustration" at the Shakespeare Illustration Archive affiliated to the University of Mainz and the Mainz Academy of Science and Literature and funded by the German Research Council. Hammerschmidt-Hummel greatly enlarged the Archive's collection, founded in 1946 by Professor Horst Oppel. In 2003, she published the three volume study *Shakespearian Illustrations from 1594 to 2000: The Work of Artists on Shakespeare's Plays*, featuring more than 3000 illustrations. In 2005, Hammerschmidt-Hummel initiated the donation of the unpublished part of the Shakespeare Illustration Archive's collection (roughly 3500 illustrations) to the Mainz Central University Library, where after the digitization process an intelligent web interface was created. In 2008, the new digital 'Shakespeare Illustration Archive Oppel-Hammerschmidt' was introduced to the public and went online in 2012.

In her further contributions to Shakespeare research, Hammerschmidt-Hummel drew on new visual and textual sources and, by cooperating with experts from different disciplines, succeeded in authenticating four images of Shakespeare, identifying the "Dark Lady" from his sonnets, and shedding new light on Shakespeare's religious affiliations. Based on these new findings, she wrote an illustrated biography of Shakespeare that answered many open questions concerning the poet's life and literary career in troubled times. The book appeared in 2003 with an English translation following in 2007.
